Please provide us with a brief description of your organization (no more than 500 words).	We are a high school wrestling team that serves many underprivileged youth. We serve both male a female student athletes- We have a boys team and a girls team. They work hard in the classroom and in the wrestling room. For many this is one of their only opportunities to make it to the next level to continue their education. We teach many skills that will follow each student athlete throughout their life, such as teamwork, perseverance, self confidence and self control.

Grant Purpose (one paragraph)

Boca Ciega High School is a public title 1 school in the Pinellas County School System. A designated Title I school serves economically disadvantaged students. Many of the students are from single-parent homes. We are seeking support for our Girl's and boys' wrestling teams. The BCHS wrestling program unites all student-athletes, regardless of skill level and background. BCHS's primary focus is ensuring every athlete receives an adequate education. Our focus is placed on developing many life lessons: sportsmanship, overcoming adversity, positive problem-solving, and teamwork. The wrestling program is not a revenue-making program. We are provided minimal financial support for the program; Therefore, the financial need superseded the monies provided to the individual students and the wrestling program. Students find themselves fundraising to meet their needs but still find us coming up short. I prefer that student-athlete focus on education and their commitment to the wrestling team. Students need the proper protective gear, and uniforms/garments/ warm-up and shoes; many cannot afford it. We never want to turn any away or not allow them to participate due to not having all the required equipment. Nor do we want to impose another financial burden on families. We are seeking financial assistance to purchase Uniforms (singlets), shoes, warm-up sets, and funding for the entry fees paid to enter wrestling tournaments and showcases, which increases the visibility of our athletes by colleges and universities. At this point in time, we are unable to outfit all the student-athletes and some are forced to sit out at no fault of their own. Because we are two separate teams, the monetary amount requested would be divided equally between both the girls and boys teams to adequately support the needs of each student athlete on each team.

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Case Statement

The Boca Ciega High School (BCHS), colloquially referred to as Bogie, home of the Pirates, is located in Gulfport, Florida. Boca Ciega High School (BCHS) is a public Title 1 school in the Pinellas County School System. A designated Title I school that serves economically disadvantaged students. Many of the students are from low to moderate-income single-parent homes.

BCHS has identified sports as a vehicle to help the youths excel and promote the vital skills to be successful and productive in adulthood. Here at BCHS, we focus on using our intramural sports to remove barriers to participation, promoting personal, social, and community development. Sports can teach values such as **fairness, team building, equality, discipline, inclusion, perseverance, and respect**. Sport has the power to provide a universal framework for learning values, thus contributing to the development of soft skills needed for responsible citizenship.

We are requesting support for our wrestling program at BCHS. Our program includes both a young male and female team, with a Junior Varsity and Varsity program available. Currently, our wrestling program has over 80 young athletes on the team. We believe in bringing together all student-athletes, regardless of skill level or background, to focus on providing quality education and ensuring every athlete receives a diploma. For those student-athletes looking to continue their

education, playing a sport at the collegiate level can help lessen the financial burden placed upon their families. Thank you for considering supporting our wrestling program at BCHS.

High school wrestling is not new. Any young lady wishing to wrestle would have to wrestle other young males. Females found themselves at a disadvantage. In 2020 The Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) voted unanimously to recognize, embraced, and sanctioned having an all-female wrestling program starting in the 2021-22 season. Offering girls, a team can enhance their chances of joining a school activity, leading to more opportunities for them to connect and feel part of the school community. Studies have shown that when students feel more connected, they tend to have better attendance, engagement, and academic performance.

The female wrestling program is in its 2nd year of inception. BCHS currently has over thirty girls and counting in the program. It is not lost on the girls they are the pioneers of the sport for all-girls wrestling teams in Florida. During the inaugural, The BCHS lady pirates were crowned district champions. The lady pirates crowned back-to-back district champs. The lady Pirates have been crowned the 2023 Pinellas County All-Conference Champs, along with several other team and individual accomplishments. We had fourteen lady pirates and seven pirates advance to Regional. We had one lady pirate State Champion.

The wrestling program is not a revenue-making program. The wrestling program receives minimal financial support. Therefore, the financial need superseded the monies provided for the wrestling program. Students find themselves fundraising to meet their needs but still find us short. I prefer that student-athletes focus on education and their commitment to the wrestling team. Students need the proper protective gear, and many cannot afford it. We never turn away any student, nor not allow them to participate due to not having all the required equipment.

Unfortunately, we found ourselves having youths sharing wrestling shoes and headgear. We lack the appropriate equipment for all the students to participate. Heartbreaking to tell a student they are not allowed to complete it simply because no equipment is available at no fault of the student; nor do we want to impose another financial burden on families.

Financial assistance is requested to purchase Uniforms (singlets), shoes, warm-up sets, mouthguards, knee pads, and headgear. The donation we seek is \$10,000. It would split equally between the girls' and boys' Teams at \$5,000 each. The monies

will also help improve the visibility of colleges and universities, we seek entry fees paid to enter wrestling tournaments and showcases. Apart from creating chances for students to connect with the school within the classroom, offering additional opportunities outside the classroom can also enhance their sense of connectedness

Problem: The BCHS wrestling team is currently facing a uniform shortage, which is causing some students to share equipment or miss out on participating. This issue has been worsened by the recent introduction of a wrestling squad exclusively for female athletes. Nonetheless, both boys and girls are welcome on the team, which fosters a supportive and encouraging family dynamic both on and off the mat. Providing each student with their uniform, warm-up set, and proper gear would significantly boost their self-esteem and enhance their academic performance.

Despite operating on a budget of less than \$1000.00 per team, with no funding provided, the BCHS wrestling team is determined to make a difference. While we are grateful for donations from other organizations, they are not enough to cover uniforms and other necessary equipment. Nevertheless, we are committed to investing in additional equipment to ensure that every student receives the support they need.

At BCHS, we prioritize education and expect our wrestling team members to embody exceptional character. Our system effectively tracks and records the academic progress of high school students participating in intramural sports, providing personalized tutoring to those who require it. Furthermore, our students are actively involved in community service projects, and we measure their success based on academic achievement and engagement in extracurricular activities. With our unwavering commitment to excellence, we are confident that our wrestling team will overcome this challenge and emerge victorious.

Assistance from the foundation: We respectfully request that the White Family Foundation extend donations to our BCHS girls' and boys' wrestling teams. The students' uniforms from previous years did not make them appear as a unified team. However, with a generous donation from the White Foundation, we will present ourselves as one cohesive team. Typically, a uniform's lifespan is around 2-3 years, depending on how often it is used and whether it sustains any damage during competitions. Uniforms and other gear are replaced items yearly. For 23 years, BCHS has successfully hosted the South Side Duals tournament, drawing in 15-25 teams from all over Florida. With the necessary funds, we plan to proudly

recognize the White Foundation as a major donor and rename the tournament to the White Family Foundation BCHS South Side Dual. This new title will be prominently displayed on all trophies and medals awarded during the tournament.

Your generous donation would significantly enhance our program, enabling us to reach new heights and foster an environment of inclusivity and equality. We appreciate your thoughtful consideration.

All funding will be specifically allocated and solely dedicated to supporting the BCHS Wrestling Program.

Recognizing the great disparity, they decided to get to know their neighborhood Title 1, (then) D-graded school. Being an alumnus of the school, but a teacher there, I have seen the changing of student attitudes and behaviors over time. Through wrestling, I am able to teach respect, loyalty, commitment, honor, the ability to be humble, and most of all the ability to persevere.

I have been a coach at Boca Ciega for the past 23 years, 15 of those being the head coach. Last year was our inaugural season for sanctioned girls wrestling. We have built a strong team. One young lady placed sixth and the other young lady won a state championship. We have a young team and are eager and hungry to continue their success.

Current Newsletters/Recent Publications Moore Brings Home State Title for Pirates

Kinea Moore is a soft-spoken and polite teenager whose friendly smile reveals a set of braces.

According to Tobey Alvarez, she is also a bully. He means it as a compliment. Alvarez is Moore's wrestling coach at Boca Ciega High School. He used the term to describe how the sophomore overpowered opponents to capture the Florida High School Athletic Association state championship.

While girls occasionally wrestled against boys in the past – with two BCHS girls earning college scholarships in the sport – this is only the second year that the

FHSAA has sanctioned girls-only wrestling, Alvarez said. All females compete together in a single classification.

Moore wrestled in the 235-pound category, the highest weight class. But she was about 40 pounds below that standard while many opponents were right on the border.

So she didn't have the typical struggle of many wrestlers to maintain a certain weight each week before a meet.

"I eat whatever I want," she said with a smile during an interview with The Gabber at school. Her coach confirmed that her weight situation gives him significant peace of mind going into each meet.

Giving the Mat a Try

Alvarez has coached wrestling for 23 years at Boca Ciega and Moore is his first state champion.

She went out for the team last year, the first year with official girls wrestling, as a freshman. She had zero experience. Moore's only previous athletic participation was swimming, she said.

But some family members convinced her to give the mat a try. "They said I should try it because I'm strong," she said.

Three dozen or so young women from around the state would likely agree. Moore compiled a 41-8 record this season.

As a freshman she qualified for the state tournament but missed the end of the season after dislocating her shoulder in a match. She needed rotator cuff surgery and the 2022-23 season was just starting by the time she recovered.

Moore had little to no indication of how well we would do when the state meet started.

"All of her opponents were new, which was a good thing," said Alvarez, who pointed out that all of her losses during the season were to two specific wrestlers.

"She went out with a blank slate."

Beating the Odds

Moore defeated an opponent from Orlando, who was one of the favorites to win the title, in less than two minutes. She then dominated another wrestler who was favored to reach the state semifinals.

The semifinal match was the toughest of the tournament, going into four overtimes against an opponent who was more than 30 pounds heavier and very near the weight limit. After winning that one, Moore pinned her opponent in the championship round in less than one minute.


"It was surreal in the moment," Alvarez said of seeing Moore atop the medal platform. "It meant a lot. It was not only my first state champion, but the second in the history of the school."

The girls' program is still in its infancy but Alvarez is getting them to buy in at BCHS. He had 36 girls on the team this year along with just over 40 boys. They practice twice a week during the offseason and participate in some tournaments, although Moore's injury prohibited her from doing that last year.

She is not the only elite athlete in her family, however. Moore noted that among her cousins are Shaquem Griffin, Shaquill Griffin, and Bernard Reedy – three Lakewood High alumni who have played in the NFL in the past few years. Needless to say, she had no idea two years ago that she would be sitting for a newspaper interview with a half-dozen or so medals draped across her lap. But Moore says she enjoys the sport and is looking ahead at possibly being a collegiate wrestler.

As for how she is handling the extra time in her schedule now that the season is over, she shared her favorite pastime to stave off boredom: "I eat."

What makes you a successful wrestler? What holds you back?

This is about hard work. I've had to practice, practice, practice, and I got better. That's what drives me to come back. I like how it feels inside, all the movement, all the competition. That's why I started wrestling in the first place, the competition. An absolute defeat can hold me back, but I have to get back up and do what I do.

Maintaining weight and strength is key. What is your conditioning regimen? How do you manage the responsibility — and pain?

I usually run after school for conditioning, I have power weightlifting and I do lacrosse to keep in shape. With pain, I usually brush it off and keep going. Pain becomes an everyday thing, you get used to it.

I don't think of wrestling as a competition. It's more entertainment for me. It's something I enjoy. That's why I do the best I can, and it helps me win. I don't think too high or too low, I don't like to get caught up with thoughts distracting me. I just do what I do.
